

Bilateral Transfer Agreement Between Lees-McRae College and Rowan-Cabarrus Community College For the Criminal Justice Program (B.A.A.S.)

Rationale

As a four-year liberal arts college, fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, Lees-McRae College (LMC) enters into this articulation agreement with Rowan-Cabarrus Community College (RCCC). This agreement furthers the efforts of both institutions to meet the educational needs of the citizens of North Carolina and to work cooperatively to improve access to higher education in their respective service districts. This agreement will pertain to those Rowan-Cabarrus Community College students who earn an Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) Degree in Criminal Justice Technology (A55180) through Rowan-Cabarrus Community College, and who seek to complete their Bachelor of Arts and Applied Science (B.A.A.S.) Degree through the Lees-McRae College Criminal Justice Program.

Transferring Student Requirements and Provisions

- A student entering with an Associate of Applied Science Degree in Criminal Justice Technology from Rowan-Cabarrus Community College as designated in this agreement will be registered with Junior class status at Lees-McRae College, with all the privileges and benefits available to students already enrolled at LMC, including application for financial assistance, eligibility for academic honors, student activities, development services, and social opportunities.
- A student transferring to LMC under this agreement shall have academic credits earned at RCCC of C and above with the condition that all requirements for graduation from RCCC meet the program of study for LMC as detailed in this articulation agreement. LMC will only accept a total of **12 credit hours** of grades of D from student transferring in with an A.A.S. Degree.
- RCCC students will enter LMC with 67 semester hours of credit, which will fulfill their General Education Core curriculum requirements for their B.A.A.S. Degree in Criminal Justice at LMC. However, a circumstance may arise when a student may need to select one three semester hour social science class to ensure they meet all major elective criteria.



Admission to Lees-McRae College and the Criminal Justice Program

- Students wishing to engage in this articulation agreement must have been awarded an A.A.S. Degree in Criminal Justice Technology (A55180) as specified in this agreement from Rowan-Cabarrus Community College.
- Accepted students articulating from Rowan-Cabarrus Community College shall be considered a "transfer student" (as described in the LMC Catalog at the time of application) and, as such, must meet all requirements for admission to LMC under that status.
- 3. Students must meet a minimum grade point average of 2.0 (on a 4.0 scale).
- 4. When LMC's Associate Provost has received all of the appropriate documents for admission (as listed in the LMC Catalog at the time of application), including an official transcript from Rowan-Cabarrus Community College the student will be notified of acceptance to LMC by the Associate Provost.

Agreement

Lees-McRae College and Rowan-Cabarrus Community College will enter this agreement beginning with the Fall semester of the 2018-2019 academic year. This document will be reviewed on a bi-annual basis and revised as needed to ensure compliance with all local, state and national accrediting bodies' policies and expectations. This agreement may be terminated by either institution by submitting a written notice of intent at least 90 days in advance. Likewise, any addenda to this agreement should be agreed to by both institutions.

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Both LMC and RCCC give mutual assurance that in performing their duties under this agreement, they will not discriminate on the basis of age, ancestry, citizenship status, color, disability, gender, national origin, race, religion, sexual orientation, veteran status, or other protected group. Reasonable accommodations for participation by disabled persons will be made in compliance with Section 504 of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Course of Study

The following is the four-year course of study plan for students beginning at Rowan-Cabarrus Community College and completing their B.A.A.S. Degree in Criminal Justice at Lees-McRae College. Since this program has been designed to meet specific educational goals based upon the two participating institutions in this agreement, students should be made aware that this particular course of study is guaranteed only to meet the transfer requirements into the Criminal Justice Program. Course substitutions will not be considered unless pre-approved by the Dean of Natural and Behavioral Sciences.
